

Wauchula Home to #1 Rural Hospital

The Florida Hospital Wauchula opened the doors to their new location on December 21, 2017, at 735 South 5th Avenue, Wauchula, just off of Rt. 17.

The move was made with the experienced medical and administrative staff whose expertise was recently recognized when Florida Hospital Wauchula was named in October 2017 the #1 Florida rural hospital by Leapfrog, a nonprofit watchdog organization. This rating is based on medication safety and low infection rate among other criteria.

I hope everyone had a great Christmas.


I want to thank the Finance Committee for an outstanding job they have done in helping the Board to make changes to provide more transparency and keep our co-op in sound financial stability.

New Florida Hospital Wauchula

(Wauchula Hospital cont'd from page 1)

There are 23 Florida Hospital locations, with the next closest in Sebring. These hospitals are faith-based but treat all patients regardless of their religious affiliation. The Wauchula hospital is designated a Critical Access Facility by the federal government requiring 24/7 Emergency Room coverage and related equipment.

The building has 15 emergency and 25 inpatient rooms, all private. Because many inpatients are there for rehabilitation and may stay for a week or two, in-patient room comforts include a TV, microwave, refrigerator, a safe, and a pullout couch for a family member to stay overnight.

Orthopedic, respiratory, speech, and occupational therapy are on site. The lab is full service including the ability to diagnose strep, mononucleosis, and bladder infections within minutes. Radiology offers standard x-ray, and CAT scans 24/7 with scheduled mammography and MRI.

This facility is best used for emergencies where patients are stabilized and then transferred to a larger hospital like Sebring if a specialist is needed.

Critical patients are air lifted from the Wauchula Hospital helipad to Tampa General for trauma (19 minute air time) or Florida Hospital Tampa for critical medical issues.

Because there is no walk-in clinic in Hardee County, if insurance allows, many people use the emergency

room for bronchitis and other less acute illnesses. The charge is less if no emergency care is needed.

A third reason patients use this hospital is for rehabilitation. They may have had a broken leg set in Sebring and then transfer to Wauchula for "rehab."

Hardee county has three ambulances whose EMT's may decide which hospital is appropriate based on a patient's condition. It is not necessary to have a local doctor to use the Wauchula or Sebring hospital. Most major insurances are accepted at either location.

The new hospital has a small cafeteria for family, visitors or locals to use. The chef is from Disney and apparently very good and meals are reasonably priced. There is also a small gift shop, always in need of volunteers to staff it. Other volunteer opportunities also exist at the hospital. Just call 863-773-3101 for more information.

A representative from the hospital will be speaking after the Monday, February 12, breakfast.







How Florida Crackers Got Their Name

“Crackers” derive their name from the rugged 19th century pioneers who developed the wild territory now known as Florida. Cattle roamed freely in the Florida woodlands and had to be rounded up before being sold and shipped up north or to Cuba.

Cow hunters used whips to round up the cattle. The whips were popped or ‘cracked,’ resulting in a sound similar to a rifle shot that would get the cattle moving.

Florida Cracker Trail

The Florida Cracker Trail begins just east of Bradenton and runs approximately 120 miles east on parts of State Road 66, State Route 64 and US Highway 98.

Each year the Florida Cracker Trail Assn. sponsors the annual Cross-State Ride from Bradenton to Ft. Pierce, a 120 mile-ride that will pass near the entrance to the Co-op between February 17-24 this year. Up to 250 riders participate in at least a portion of the ride.

Cracker Trail History
Manatee Village is the western terminus of the Florida Cracker Trail, a route that has existed since approximately 1850. It is located at 1404 Manatee Avenue East (SR 64) in Bradenton.

This historical park has free admission and 14 points of interest. It is a great way to learn about the history of Manatee County and Old Florida long before paved roads and electricity.

The Cracker Trail Museum is located in Zolfo Springs on the corner of State Route 64 and US Route 17. It is home to a collection of over 4,000 items related to pioneer-era Florida history preserving the history of Hardee County. Admission is \$2 plus tax.

Fire Ant Facts

We all know what a menace fire ants can be with their wide presence and their painful stings. Below are some interesting facts about fire ants.

- ◆ There are several varieties of fire ants, but the most common variety in the U.S. is the Red Imported Fire Ant that is native to South America. These ants were accidentally brought into the United States around 1940 on board a cargo ship through the port at Mobile, Alabama.
- ◆ A fire ant colony can have up to 250,000 ants.
- ◆ A colony consists of a queen, female worker ants, female soldier ants, and male drones.
- ◆ The only job of a drone is to mate with the queen, after which the drone dies.
- ◆ Fire ants can live for 6 or 7 years.
- ◆ A queen can lay an astonishing 1,600 eggs a day!
- ◆ Tunnels can radiate out up to 25 feet from a mound and can be up to 10 feet deep.
- ◆ Fire ants grasp onto each other to form large, floating mats to ride out high water. Ants within the mat slowly circulate from bottom to top to take turns at breathing.
- ◆ A fire ant bites its victim not to spray acid the way most ants do, but to get a good grip on their victim so they can turn their abdomen to inject venom from the stinger located at the tip of the abdomen.
- ◆ Unlike bees that die after stinging once, fire ants can sting repeatedly.

Large Print: Any large print book, fiction or non-fiction is in this section. This includes romance; suspense, cookbooks, biographies, etc. so always check that section along with the standard print sections for your subject or author.

General fiction and non-fiction is a catch-all for books not suited to the more specific categories. However, it never hurts to check these sections for your particular subject or author preference.

Westerns have their own section.

Military includes military biographies and autobiographies.

Biographies and autobiographies other than military are in a separate section.

Christian non-fiction includes bibles, devotions, and Christian self-help.

Crafts and Hobbies is a new section. **Cookbooks, Diets, Health, Dictionaries, RV/Travel, DVD's, and Audio Books** have their own sections.

The Library Committee asks that you not shelve books. Please drop your returned and/or donated books and DVDs in the white basket inside the Library door because we have a check IN system to track circulation.
