Proposals 3 and 6 for by-law changes were approved, most notably the CO-OP becoming a 55+ community. It essentially enables the park to continue to be governed by our own bylaws and protects us from certain discrimination claims while preserving the nature of our resort as a retirement place for older persons.

Proposals 1, 8, 9 and 10 regarding changes to our standing rules passed. Proposals 2, 4, 5, and 7 failed or were returned to committee.

Thank you to the park guests who prepared and served lunch so that the members could participate in this important meeting.

- address possible issues of controversy
- 4. help sponsors of the proposals prepare for their presentation

Fire Ant Update

Last month we told you about fire ant bait that was going to be applied to green spaces and public areas around the Co-op as a test.

The bait is supposed to be able to kill entire colonies of ants making it possible to go 3 to 6 mos. between applications.

Initial results for bait applied during the week of Feb. 12 look promising. After 48 hours, most of the previously -active ant mounds had no more ants, and almost all ants were gone after 72 hours.

The treated areas will be monitored over the coming weeks to see how long it takes fire ants to reappear. More tests are planned over the summer.

Departure Checklist

Check lists are an excellent tool for packing your rv, hitching up, or packing for a trip, especially if it is something you do infrequently.

We are in the process of creating a list to help members prepare their sites and RVs for their summer absence.

Here is the start of our list. What have we missed? What do you do? Send your suggestions to the *Cracker Crumbs* editor.

- Trim any vegetation that could interfere with mowing.
- Check shed for leaks, and any loose shingles/siding. Repair before leaving if possible.
- Close, lock windows and cover with reflective material if desired.
- Remove detached steps, potted plants & other outdoor items which could move in a storm.
- Protect items in sheds, tied down rigs and park models from humidity.
- Empty refrigerator and cupboards of food items which may spoil.
- Turn off propane.
- If you leave electricity on, be sure appliances and other electric cords are in good condition and circuits are not overloaded.
- Remove items which could melt during the summer heat. (candles, medicines)
- Close and lock hurricane shutters.
- Seal cracks and crevices to keep rodents from moving in.

Huli Huli Chicken Serves 6

1/2 c. brown sugar

- 3 T. ketchup
- 3 T. reduced-sodium soy sauce
- 2 3/4 T. sherry or chicken broth
- 1 1/4 t. minced fresh ginger
- 1 1/4 t. minced garlic

12 boneless chicken thighs (about 2 1/2 #)

Mix first six ingredients. Reserve half for basting; cover and refrigerate.

Place thighs and remaining marinade in large resealable plastic bag. Turn to coat. Refrigerate for 8 hours or overnight.

Drain and discard marinade from chicken. Moisten a paper towel with cooking oil; using long-handled tongs, lightly coat the grill rack.

Grill chicken, covered, over medium heat for 6-8 mins. on each side or until no longer pink. Baste occasionally with reserved marinade during the last 5 mins.

Maxwell Groves is located in Avon Park. Turn left out of the park on to Route 64 and continue to Avon Park. After crossing Route 27, continue past the Jacaranda Hotel, on your left. At the other end of town, you'll pass the small lake and travel up the hill past the high school. Just after the high school, on the left, you'll see a sign for Maxwell Groves.

As you go inside and walk to the back room to get a drink of their great juice, you'll pass by their orange ice cream machine.

The machine makes both vanilla and orange ice cream, available in a twist if you wish. The 'in the know locals' will tell you to get just orange, and we always do. It is a very refreshing soft serve orange, only made when oranges are in season. It contains no cream or milk products but is very smooth. We have a friend who drives for more than an hour to get this treat.

Just another little hidden Florida location you'll come back to visit. Oh yes, the orange treat must be eaten in one of those rockers.

Peace River Walk-n-Talk

Hosted by the City of Wauchula, this guided tour of Peace River Park on Thursday, March 8, is free and open to the public.

Sturdy walking shoes, sunscreen, and water are recommended. The tour will start at 9 am and typically lasts two hours.
