March reservations will be taken beginning October 1.

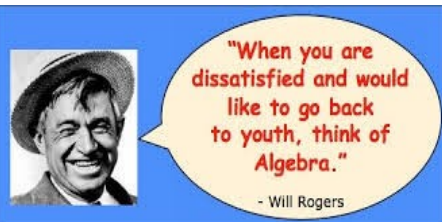
## Important Request

## Shelter Seminar & Emergency Preparedness

Jill Newman, Director of Hardee County Emergency Management, spoke to 25 Escapees at the Florida SKP Resort on July 16. Jill informed the group that her staff responds to such disasters as hazardous material spills, brush fires, and other emergency incidents.

Emergency responders include about 35 individuals from Hardee County offices such as Health Department, Building and Zoning, hospitals, schools, etc., who practice simulated disasters on a regular basis.

Of primary interest to our group was how to respond to a hurricane. The hurricane season, June 1 through November 30, is predicted to have 13 named storms in 2018 including as many as 6 hurricanes, 2 of which are expected to be Category 3 or above.

### Personal Evac Preparations

- In preparation for an approaching hurricane, follow instructions from local officials and use this checklist:
- Check on your neighbors.
- Unplug appliances but set the refrigerator to its highest setting if you're leaving food in it.
- Turn off propane
- Cover windows.
- Fill the tub with water.
- Take pictures of your home, inside and out, and send the pictures to someone outside the area.
- Review your insurance policy.
- Plan for where your group should meet afterward.
- Fill your vehicle's gas tank.
- Cover the windows of your home.
- Remove outside objects that could become projectiles.
- Tie down golf carts.
- Wear sturdy shoes.
- Know your evacuation routes SR64, SR66, SR62, and US Hwy 17 from the Florida SKP Resort.
- Do not drive through flooded areas.

As a hurricane approaches and sustained winds become 40 mph and greater, the emergency management staff will be expected to be in place to open and prepare shelters. Public notices will appear on radio and Facebook as well as the Hardee County website, <http://www.hardeecounty.net/eoc.htm>.

### Shelter Location

Jill Newman suggested that residents do a dry run to the shelter which is Hardee County Jr. High and Hilltop Elementary, the largest and newest building in the county and which was built to hurricane standards. The school (863-773-27500) is located at 2401 US Highway 17 North, about 6.5 miles north on Hwy 17. The entrance is located across the highway from the street leading to Crystal Lake Village. The front door may be locked but there should be signs directing you to turn left to the south wing of the building.

### Important Information for Special Needs

People with special needs can shelter at South Florida State College Hardee Campus (863-773-3081), located at 2868 US Hwy 17N, Bowling Green, on the right beyond the intersection of SR 62.

However, these people must complete an application every January. Applications are available online at

or can be completed at the Emergency Operation Center (on the east side of the courthouse), 404 West Orange Street.

Applicants must require 24-hour electric or need assistance with mobility and must provide the name of the power company (Peace River Electric Co-operative for SKPS).

### Disaster Kit Preparation

Residents are advised to prepare a disaster kit. A 5-gallon bucket is a good container because it is waterproof when sealed. Suggested contents include:

- Flashlight and fresh batteries
- A fully-charged phone
- One change of clothes
- Medicines
- Special or snack food (Food will be served at the school but there will be no accommodation for special diets.)
- Important documents
- Weather radio with extra batteries.
- 3 gallons of water per person

### Pets

Hardee County does not have a pet-friendly shelter. Instead, you might choose to make a reservation early at a hotel that accepts pets. Take a crate, leash, and the pet's food and water.

**ALERT**  **Hardee County**  
Emergency Management's Mass Notification System

Hardee County has launched a new mass notification service that will inform you of emergency alerts.. When you opt-in, you'll enter your contact information and subscribe to notifications that you would like to receive.

When Hardee County issues a notification about a time-sensitive event, you will receive the information by the methods you registered with (voice, email, text or App).

You can register with Alert Hardee County by going to <http://www.hardeecounty.net/eoc.htm> Scroll down and click on Alert Hardee County to begin your registration. You can opt out of the program at any time.

### Final Thoughts

Keep in mind that shelters are crowded and noisy. People will have to sit and sleep on the floor. Instead, you might choose to stay with a friend who has a cement block house or one that has been built since 2006. DO NOT STAY IN RVS OR MOBILE HOMES.

## Maintenance Updates

### Electric

Palmer Electric performed preventive maintenance on all the site electrical boxes.



Connections in all the electric boxes, were tightened, replaced, if necessary, and "no ox" was applied to the connections to prevent oxidation.

Palmer reported that the overall condition of our electric boxes was good and better than expected.

### Water Tank

A mysterious utility trailer was parked by the yard sale shed recently, but who knew it contained the water that would be used while the main water tank was emptied and relined? (Well, of course, Danny knew!)

The tank has been sand blasted, and a primer coat of rust inhibitor has been applied. After the primer dries, the fiberglass coating will be put on and a sand filter will be added.

### Kitchen Refrigerator

The condenser is leaking coolant. Our options are to replace the condenser at a cost of \$1,500 or buy a new refrigerator at a cost of \$5,000. The Board believes the repair is the best plan of action at this time.

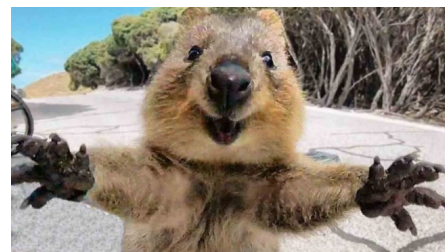

# Summer at the Co-op

## Park Flora & Fauna

As most of you will remember, we planted five new Sabal Palm street trees last January. Unfortunately, one of them didn't make it, and we had to take it out.



However, the other 4 are doing great and are finally showing signs of growth. The top fronds of all of them are at least 15 to 18" taller than when they arrived and were all clipped back. The one on the Hodgkins' lot (H-10) is doing so well that it has at least 3 separate fronds sprouting from the top, and it's even blooming!

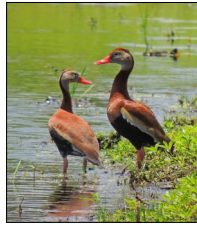
We have been getting a lot of rain here in Florida which means the level of the retention pond is up so our floating island has been wandering all over the place. I have been periodically spraying herbicide

on the banks and on the parts of the island I can reach to knock down the brush that keeps sprouting. As parts of the island break off, the smaller pieces sometimes end up close to the bank where I can reach them with a rake and pull out more of the floating debris. I'm hoping we can eventually get rid of it altogether.

Speaking of the pond, we get frequent feathered visitors. I often see one or more Ibis wading along the bank.



Black Bellied Whistling Ducks came to the pond fairly regularly in June and July. Whistling Ducks do what their name says – they whistle instead of quack. When there are ducks at the pond, there are usually at least two of them (probably a pair – the males and females are very similar in appearance), but I have seen as many as 4 adults and 6 juveniles (brown speckled appearance).



Tri-colored Herons are also frequent visitors to the pond.

The white bird in the background of the photo of the Tri-colored Heron is a Cattle Egret. Cattle Egrets feed primarily on insects so they like to hang around cattle because cattle tend to stir up insects as they graze. However, Cattle Egrets sometimes also feed on small frogs. I usually see Cattle Egrets at the pond only when the neighbor's cattle are in the field behind the pond.

I have also seen one or two Snowy Egrets at the pond on occasion, but they are somewhat skittish and are therefore hard to photograph.

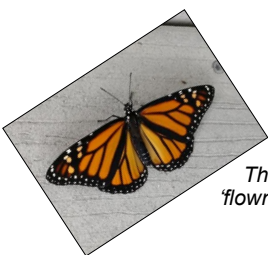


Susan & Ron Wzsalek met up with Ed & Cathy Landry in Montreal for a week-long exploration.

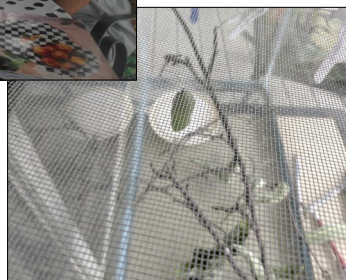


Steve & Anne Warren enjoyed lunch with Dean & Cheryl Lamoreaux in the Lamoreaux's New York gazebo pictured above.
