Seven proposals were presented for a vote. By-law changes and assessments require a 2/3 yes vote of the entire membership which is 84 yes votes. Standing rule changes require a simple majority of members which is 64 yes votes.

A quorum was established by the 67 members present and 34 proxies received for a total of 101 of the 126 members represented.

Proposal 1—By-Law Change Move the annual meeting to the first Tuesday in March FAILED 43 Yes

Proposal 2—By-Law Change Include an updated list of committees PASSED 93 Yes

Proposal 3—Standing Rule Amend that members as well as nonmembers cannot feed the wildlife.

Capital Improvement Fund Passed What's Next?

Now that the Capital Improvement Fund has been approved by the membership, we can continue to evaluate and develop plans to upgrade park-owned rental sites to full-service, park-owned sites that will not be converted to member sites. If the engineering plans show the project to be feasible, the membership will vote to approve the project before moving forward.

If the membership approves, it will then result in an assessment of each membership \$240 for the Capital Improvement Fund while providing a \$240 credit and increasing members' lot values by \$240.

Proposal 4—Standing Rule Remove requirement to have liability and damage insurance for any vehicle in storage on file in the office

PASSED 91 Yes

Proposal 5—Standing Rules
Amend the Wait List Rules to update, simplify and clarify the present rules.

PASSED 91 Yes

Proposal 6—Standing Rules
Continue the variance to allow longer rental periods until March 31,
2020. PASSED 88 Yes

Proposal 7—Capital Improvement Fund Assess each membership \$240 for the Capital Improvement Fund while providing a \$240 credit and increasing members' lot values by \$240.

PASSED Yes 86

It was moved and approved to designate the Clubhouse Founders' Hall and for Fun 'n Sun to purchase an appropriate plaque to place in the main hall.

This annual meeting went on record as one of the shortest in under 3 hours.

Report on the Occupancy of the Clubhouse

The Emergency and Safety Committee reported on February 12 the maximum occupancy and the maximum building capacity of the Clubhouse as determined by Hardee County Fire Prevention Officer Juanita Gaitan.

Officer Gaitan met with representatives of the committee, Bud and Marsha Hodgkins, on February 11 to give the official word on how many people we could have in the clubhouse for meals and meetings. In the newly named Founders' Hall, with tables and chairs for dining or meetings, the maximum occupancy is 208. Changing the size of the stage, or 'platform' as the FD refers to it, would not make any difference. We have not exceeded that at any of our meals or meetings.

A new occupancy sign for Founders' Hall will be remounted above the door.

"Ecology of a Cracker Childhood" by Janisse Ray

The themes of this book include Ray's dismay at the disappearance of the longleaf pine ecosystem due to over-logging, and how Ray and her family persevered through poverty living in the dusty remains of what was once forest. Ray describes growing up in a junkyard operated by her parents in southern Georgia.

The book alternates between Ray's fascinating family life and her description of plants and animals now endangered without the pines. Ray's life is not unlike that of the Florida Crackers, the original Florida settlers.

The book is a quick read, funny in parts, and leaves one with a better understanding of both poverty and our environment.



As requested, the recipe for the dessert served at the spaghetti dinner.

FROM THE KITCHEN OF Jan Pratt

1 sleeve graham crackers, crushed 1. Mix graham cracker crumbs

1 1 /2 c. sugar

1/2 c. butter, melted

1 c. boiling water

3 oz. lemon jello

8 oz. cream cheese

1 t. vanilla

1 can Milnot or Carnation evaporated milk COLD

RECIPE Fluffy Cheesecake

- Mix graham cracker crumbs with 1/4 c. of sugar and the butter. (Reserve 1/4—1/3 c of crumbs for top.)
- 2. Place in 9 x 13 glass or metal nan.
- 3. Dissolve jello in boiling water, stirring until dissolved then set in freezer until it starts to set.



- 4. Have cream cheese at room temperature. Mix with 1 c. sugar and vanilla.
- 5. Mix into jello mixture.
- 6. Whip COLD canned milk until very thick.
- 7. Fold jello/cheese mixture into the whipped milk.
- 8. Pour over crust. Sprinkle with reserved graham cracker crumbs.
- 9. Place in refrigerator or freezer until set.

by Safety Committee Check lists are an excellent tool for packing your RV, hitching up, or packing for a trip,



especially if it is something you do infrequently.

We are in the process of creating a list to help members prepare their sites and RVs for their summer absence.

Here is the start of our list. What have we missed? What do you do? Send your suggestions to the Oficce Attn: Safety Committee.

- Trim any vegetation that could interfere with mowing.
- · Check shed for leaks, and any loose shingles/siding. Repair before leaving if possible.
- · Close, lock windows and cover with reflective material if desired.

- · Remove detached steps, potted plants & other outdoor items which could move in a storm.
- Protect items in sheds, tied-down rigs and park models from humidity.
- Empty refrigerator and cupboards of food items which may spoil.
- Turn off propane.
- If you leave electricity on, be sure appliances and other electric cords are in good condition and circuits are not overloaded.
- Remove items which could melt during the summer heat. (candles, medicines)
- Close and lock hurricane shutters.
- Seal cracks and crevices to keep rodents from moving in.
